# News from Lou

Early in November, Heather Long, Chief Operating Officer, held town hall meetings for the staff. She did three days of meetings for The Villages® Hospital and three for Leesburg hospital with a meeting every hour. The topics covered were our Mission, Values and an update on what's happening for UF Health Central

Florida. The meeting I attended was a very informative, upbeat session and I wanted to give you a recap of it.

Our Mission is "To improve the health and quality of life of the individuals and communities we serve." At UF Health our core institutional values are centered around our commitment to our patients and our role in serving our communities. Our values are

- (1) **Service Excellence:** We will consistently meet and manage the expectations of our patients, through the combination of clinical excellence and patient-centered care, providing outstanding personal service.
- (2) **Teamwork:** We are a united team dedicated to providing service excellence ensuring safe high quality care for our patients.
- (3) **Accountability:** We will take responsibility for our own actions, maintaining integrity as we fulfill our mission.
- (4) **Respect:** We will make every effort to preserve the dignity and maintain the respect of our patients and each other.

Heather also briefed us on current and future happenings. The construction on the new Cardiac and Vascular area should be complete by March 2023. This is an addition of 26,000 sq. ft. bringing all cardiac treatment, procedures and patient rooms together in one area. The Brownwood standalone emergency center has been so successful, there are plans for additional centers in surrounding communities. These will be a new concept of an emergency department and an urgent care combined. The Brownwood Emergency Center is adding 8-10 additional rooms since their patient volume has been so high. The Ambulatory Surgery Center on the East Campus will open in May 2023. **This is an exciting time to be part of The Villages® Hospital and UF Health Central Florida!**

Heather spoke about managers having to be in a tactical mode of operating during the pandemic, such as do we have enough staff, do we need tents for overflow of Covid patients, do we have enough vaccine and treatment meds etc. - a mode of managing that lost the personal touch with patients where we were not exhibiting compassion. We need to lead differently, from tactical to the complete picture, now that things have calmed down. Our objective is to get the patient to trust us and feel sure that we are doing everything we can for them. Her advice to the staff is "Don't be afraid to show your heart" to patients. Our objective is for the patient to have an excellent patient experience that exceeds their expectations of the hospital.

As volunteers we can certainly contribute to making the patient experience an excellent one in a number of ways. You are a key to the hospital's success! Thank you for being a concerned, conscientious and dedicated volunteer.

This time of year is for celebrating our faith and wishing each other a very Merry Christmas and Happy Holiday Season! My hope for each of you this season is that you get to spend time with family and friends enjoying good food, great fellowship and a time of worship.

# Our President Shares

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to everyone! Each year at this time many people begin to write New Year's Resolutions, most of which are forgotten by March. I try to think about the last part of the greeting and work to be happy in everything I do. As Roger Miller said in a song a long time ago, "You can be happy if you've a mind to." And Joyce Meyer says we should be "enjoying everyday life."

I was a language major in college, and have been amazed how barriers disappear if people work together as a team. In high school I tutored a blind man in Spanish. He came to my house every Saturday and we had a one-hour lesson. I taught him to speak a new language and he taught me how to serve a cup of coffee so he could put his finger in the cup to judge the temperature, turn the handle so he knew where it was, and he enjoyed coffee during the lesson.

In 1976, George was meeting executives in Yugoslavia to terminate a contract between their government and his company. His boss gave us good advice when he suggested we start with a couple of days in London so we could adjust to different currency and transportation while we could still speak the same language. From there we went to Vienna and finally got word that a meeting had been set up in 2 days. We boarded a train for Ljubljana and the adventure began. When we stopped at the Yugoslav border, soldiers carrying machine guns entered the train and roamed our car. They took our passports and left with them. Twenty minutes went by and they had not returned nor given us any explanation. A man in the same car saw that we were worried and came to ask us if we were Americans. We said we were and George showed him his T-shirt which said "Oklahoma." The man smiled and said "Oh, Oklahoma like in the song." Then he left the car and visited with the soldiers. A few minutes later our passports were returned and we continued the journey.

On the return trip we spent time in Paris and stopped for lunch at a Bistro near The Louvre. We thought we had ordered our meals and 2 glasses of wine but, when the meal arrived, there was only one entrée. When the server understood the dilemma,

he was totally embarrassed. I replied in my best French accent "Ne vous inquietez pas." (Don't worry). He smiled and replied "Formidable." Problem solved and he arrived with a second entrée very soon.

We had extended stays in London a couple of times. Even so, language can be a bit challenging translating true English to American English. For example, a jumper there is a sweater here. But I had to visit a book store to find an English to English dictionary when I couldn't understand the television news. They were talking about an articulated lorry and I had no idea what that was. I knew a lorry was a truck and, when I looked it up, I discovered it was what we call a semi-truck. We were there when Princess Diana died and shared the grief of the locals. People in George's office in Oklahoma asked us to buy flowers and advised what to write on the cards. We carried about 30 bouquets and placed them outside Buckingham Palace. Londoners reached out to us after the Oklahoma City bombing in 1995. Shared grief is the same no matter which side of the pond you are on.

When we spent time in the Netherlands, George was in a manager's office one day with a fellow who was speaking French with him. He was on the phone with someone in Germany and was speaking German. Then another employee walked into the office and he spoke Dutch with him...all at the same time. I searched for a course to learn Dutch but didn't find one. Everyone in the Netherlands wants to speak English and many of the adults in our small compound didn't speak English but all their children wanted to converse with us in English. Our landlord didn't speak a bit of English but we managed to converse when we had heating issues.



**R**emember, we can be happy if we've a mind to and we can enjoy everyday life. That is always my new year's resolution.

She is an extraordinary nurse and she is a wonderful addition to your team. You are lucky to have her."

**Tammy Kelley** is our third quarter DAISY Award winner with these accolades. "Tammy is a caring and calming nurse. She answers all of our questions with compassion and professionalism. She never gets annoyed. Tammy makes my husband feel happy even when he is scared. She explains everything so that we understand

completely. Even though my husband was her patient, Tammy found out it was my birthday and surprised me with a cupcake and a song! She works so hard for her patients and sometimes doesn't even take a lunch. I have also witnessed her uplifting the spirits of my husband's hospital roommate. 
